1. Lehmann deems the more inflammatory varieties of anti-Semitism to be less dangerous than Treitschke's more moderate position. Why is that?
2. To what does Lehmann attribute Treitschke's positive view of English and French Jews?
3. According to Lehmann, how do anti-Semites like Treitschke deal with the fact that in their own circles there are Jews with whom they happily associate?
4. What reason is given for why Jews are being targeted in Germany at this time?
5. What is Lehmann's assessment of the overall conduct of German Jews?
6. Using Lehmann's assertions, give three examples of the historian, Treitschke, being "unhistorical." The three examples should not all come from the same paragraph.
7. Are there indications that German anti-Semitism contains a racial component? Explain.
